Then the other disciple also went in, the one who had arrived at the tomb first, and he saw and believed. For they did not yet understand the Scripture that he had to rise from the dead.





Easter Sunday
 The first light of Easter dawn had begun to creep over the horizon. The steadfast women from Friday's gory events are returning again to the body of their Lord. "Who will roll back the stone for us from the entrance to the tomb?" How quickly we return to mundane concerns and how thoroughly God wants to surprise us! Imagine the utter shock upon seeing the stone rolled away, the tomb empty, and a stranger clothed in light proclaiming the impossible. "You seek Jesus of Nazareth, the crucified. He has been raised; he is not here." He is risen indeed and the world will never be the same.




We know from other Gospel passages that Mary Magdalene made haste to the disciples to proclaim the Good News. We know that Peter and John rushed to the tomb to see for themselves. We know that the wonder and awe of the Resurrection permeated the lives of the apostles until their own dying day.

Can we comprehend the utterly world-changing nature of this surprise? The historical reanimation of a dead man is of no real value to us. But we know that Easter Sunday is so much more. By the Resurrection of Jesus, life has triumphed over death for us all. The gates of heaven are opened and the treasury of graces is poured out upon the here and now. This Resurrection Day, let us draw near, amazed yet unafraid, to the risen Christ. Let us recall the words of Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI, "Jesus is not a character from the past. He lives, and he walks before us as one who is alive, he calls us to follow him, the living one, and in this way to discover for ourselves the path of life" (Easter Vigil, April 15, 2006).

 My dear brothers and sisters in Christ,
 The scripture accounts of the Resurrection speak about the need for those who encountered the Risen Lord to share joyfully the good news with others. What made their message credible was the fact that they were witnesses - they had seen the Risen Lord.



There are so many ways that we are able to see the Risen Lord each day. We see Him most perfectly in the Holy Eucharist where Jesus is substantially present - body, blood, soul and divinity - under the appearance of bread and wine. Christ is also present in the Sacred Scriptures. In both the Old Testament and in the New Testament, Jesus the Word of God is present to strengthen our faith. Jesus is present in us and in the community of faith, as Jesus says, "For where two or three are gathered in my name, I am among them" (Mt. 18:20). We also know that the glory of God can be found in nature. As Genesis reminds us, God made all things and what He made was good. We can encounter Jesus in the beauty of creation. If we have encountered the Risen Lord in so many ways, how do we witness to this fact?

Do we share the good news that we have 'seen the Lord' so that others may come to know, love and serve Him? The theme for our Sixtieth Diocesan Anniversary is, "Put Out into the Deep" and it focuses on drawing people to Christ. We do this by joyfully witnessing to our faith and to the fact that we have seen the Lord. This is the heart of evangelization and something that we are called to do as followers of Jesus.

It is my hope and prayer that during the Easter Season we will take some time to consider prayerfully what it means to be a witness to the Resurrection. What am I doing to bring people to Christ? Perhaps it can begin by simply extending an invitation to someone to join you for the Sacred Triduum or Easter Mass. Do not be afraid to "Put Out into the Deep." You may be surprised by what you discover.

May the Risen Lord grant you a grace-filled Easter.

The Feast of Divine Mercy, celebrated on the Octave of Easter (the Sunday after Easter Sunday), is a relatively new addition to the Roman Catholic liturgical calendar. Celebrating the Divine Mercy of Jesus Christ, as revealed by Christ Himself to Saint Maria Faustina Kowalska, this feast was extended to the entire Catholic Church by Pope John Paul II on April 30, 2000, the day that he canonized Saint Faustina.

Divine Mercy Sunday, April 8th: Our Lord said to Saint Faustina: *Encourage souls to say the Chaplet which I have given to you. Whoever will recite it will receive great mercy at the hour of death....When they say this chaplet in the presence of the dying, I will stand between My Father and the dying person, not as the just judge but as the Merciful Saviour. Priests will recommend it to sinners as their last hope of salvation. Even if there were a sinner most hardened, if he were to recite this chaplet only once, he would receive grace from My infinite mercy. I desire to grant unimaginable graces to those souls who trust in My mercy... Through the Chaplet you will obtain everything, if what you ask for is compatible with My will.*
