

Evangelization: *Asia*—That opportunities may increase for dialogue and encounter between the Christian faith and the peoples of Asia.


Catholic Women's League

Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time
 "When the people in the synagogue heard this, they were all filled with fury." Why were these folks furious? Because they didn't like what Jesus told them. They took offense at his teaching that "no prophet is accepted in his own native place." Jesus was implying that his fellow Nazarenes in the synagogue were blind to who he really was. And this made them mad. They didn't like being told that they were wrong. But Jesus told them anyway. He knew that these people needed to hear the truth, even if it meant that he would be unpopular. In fact, he spoke the truth even at risk of his own life. "They rose up, drove him out of the town, and led him to the brow of the hill on which their town had been built, to hurl him down headlong."


It can be tempting to confuse Jesus' kindness and goodness with passivity, mistakenly imagining him as a person who would never ruffle any feathers because he was so concerned about being "nice." This one-sided image of Jesus can lead us to excuse our own passivity about the falsehood and evil that surrounds us. We can justify our silence or inaction by convincing ourselves that we shouldn't upset anyone.

But the fact is that Jesus upset people on a regular basis. That wasn't his goal, of course, but he was willing to deal with resistance for the sake of truth and justice. And we should be willing to do the same.


Our world is growing more and more hostile to the message of the Gospel. When we simply live our faith authentically, it makes some people angry. But we should not recoil from this reality. Jesus' witness made people furious too. But when they got mad, he didn't cave in. Whether people like it or not, the truth does not change.



Feast of St. Blaise—February 3rd—the day when we, as Catholics, participate in the beautiful tradition of having our throats blessed. To do this, the priest consecrates two candles, generally by a prayer, and then holds each in a crossed position on the throat of the person being blessed. At the same time the following blessing is given: "Through the intercession of Saint Blaise, bishop and martyr, may God deliver you from ailments of the throat and from every other evil. In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen." **If you would like to participate in this tradition, Fr. Chad will bless throats following all weekend masses of Feb 6/7.** Why does this blessing of the throat take place on the feast of St. Blaise? St. Blaise, a physician and bishop, asked God to cure a child who was choking to death on a fish bone and the child's life was saved. Thus, **St. Blaise is the patron saint of healthy throats.**



Lent begins February 10th There are traditionally forty days in Lent which are marked by fasting, both from foods and festivities, and by other acts of penance. The three traditional practices to be taken up with renewed vigor during Lent are prayer (justice towards God), fasting (justice towards self), and almsgiving (justice towards neighbour). Today, some people give up something they enjoy, and often give the time or money spent doing that thing to charitable purposes or organizations. Lent is a season of sorrowful reflection that is punctuated by breaks in the fast on Sundays (the day of the resurrection); thus, Sundays are not counted in the forty days of Lent. **Masses Ash Wednesday....9:30am & 7pm.** The distribution of ashes reminds us of our own mortality and calls us to repentance. The ashes that we receive are a reminder of our own sinfulness, and many Catholics leave them on their foreheads all day as a sign of humility.



The Jubilee Year of Mercy : In response to our Bishop's request, St. Ann's will have a Prayer Hour for Mercy with Eucharistic Adoration every Monday evening at 7:00 p.m. The Sacrament of Confession will be available during that time until 7:55 p.m. when we will have Benediction. In addition, Confession will be available before each weekday Mass from 9:00 a.m. to 9:20 a.m. Tuesday to Friday beginning Tuesday December 8. Confessions on Saturday will be increased: the Sacrament will be available from 9:00 a.m. to 10:00 a.m. beginning Saturday December 12, in addition to the usual 4:00 p.m. to 4:45 p.m. It is my hope that this Year of Mercy will be a time of increased prayer and increased reception of the Sacraments, especially Confession and the Eucharist, so that we may grow much closer to Our Lord Jesus Christ and better appreciate and put into practice the great love and mercy He shows us.

Volunteers needed for the Syrian Refugee Crisis
 As on many occasions in the past, we are once again called upon to assist our brothers and sisters in need who have no reasonable hope of returning to their homes. Pope Francis has called on every parish, religious community, and shrine in Europe to welcome a refugee family. The Pope has led by example by sponsoring one family at the Vatican. The Catholic Church in Canada processes incredible untapped potential to welcome and resettle many of these refugees. The Bishops of Canada have called on every parish that has the resources to sponsor a refugee family to seriously consider doing so, either alone or working in collaboration with others. Bishop Bergie has requested that we also follow the direction of the Pope by sponsoring a family in each parish; thirteen parishes in our diocese have already applied and have been approved by our Canadian Government, and are now awaiting their families.

Some members of our parish family have attended meetings at the Catholic Centre to determine what would be required to participate in this service of charity for refugees. The objectives are to assist newcomers with their adjustment to a new community and life in Canada as well as the following:

- To provide effective and efficient support and offer safe and temporary lodgings.
- Network with social aid agencies providing essential services such as ESL, secondary settlement, legal and other social services.
- Provide transportation to government and medical offices.
- Counselling and assistance in documentation.
- Food and clothing.

To be a participant in this moment of human history we have to establish a Committee to enable their integration and build a welcoming community. **How can you help?** Please speak to Father Chad or Deacon Jim after Mass or let Liliana know of your interest to become a member of our St. Ann's team.

Excerpt of the Message of His Holiness Pope Francis for the 24th World Day of the Sick, 2016 (February 11th, 2016).
Entrusting Oneself to the Merciful Jesus like Mary: "Do whatever he tells you" (Jn 2:5) On this World Day of the Sick let us ask Jesus in his mercy, through the intercession of Mary, his Mother and ours, to grant to all of us this same readiness to be serve those in need, and, in particular, our infirm brothers and sisters. At times this service can be tiring and burdensome, yet we are certain that the Lord will surely turn our human efforts into something divine. We too can be hands, arms and hearts which help God to perform his miracles, so often hidden. We too, whether healthy or sick, can offer up our toil and sufferings like the water which filled the jars at the wedding feast of Cana and was turned into the finest wine. By quietly helping those who suffer, as in illness itself, we take our daily cross upon our shoulders and follow the Master (cf. Lk 9:23). Even though the experience of suffering will always remain a mystery, Jesus helps us to reveal its meaning.
